


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Visit the Centennial of Flight Web site...

Why is December 17, 2003, an important historical anniversary for all of us?

- Research your State's aviation and aerospace history. Who were the people involved? What did they do? When and where did they do it? Design a poster representing the history of aviation and aerospace in your city, county, and/or State. The posters featured on the Centennial of Flight Commission's Home Page (<http://www.centennialofflight.gov>) may give you a few ideas. Use the "Educational Resource Matrix" under the "For Educators and Students" section of the Home Page to track down information for your project and learn about additional exciting aviation and aerospace resources.
- Create a calendar or timeline noting the significant people, places, and historical aviation and aerospace events you identify during the course of your research. Share your poster and calendar with others in your school, community, and State. Send an electronic copy of your poster and calendar or timeline to the Centennial of Flight Commission's Web site.
- Check out the Centennial of Flight Commission's Web-based "Calendar" to find out about aviation and centennial of flight events. Plan your own centennial of flight celebrations and add them to the "Calendar" via the "Submit an Event" feature.
- Identify aviation and aerospace visitor centers and museums located in your State by exploring the "Aviation Museums" category on the "Educational Resources Matrix."
- Discuss how the advances in aviation and aerospace during the past 100 years have affected you and your family. Imagine what changes will occur in aviation and aerospace in the next 100 years. Explore the "Student Competitions" sections provided on the "Educational Resources Matrix."



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
