- She was born in Tuscomb, Alabama on June 27, 1880.
- Died in 1968.
- Became deaf and blind in 1882.
- Was a student of Anne Sullivan for thirteen years.
- First word that she was able to sign was “water”.
- Increased her vocabulary from 30 words to 300 in a few short months.
